Celebrating 10 years of gay marriage in Canada - Toronto's Metropolitan Community Church

Ten years after officiating at the first gay marriage in Canada, Rev. Brent Hawkes presided at a Renewal of Vows Ceremony on Friday, January 15th, 2011 at MCCT, Metropolitan Community Church. Both history-making couples – Anne and Elaine Vautour and Joe Varnell and Kevin Bourassa - stood in front of Rev. Hawkes and a congregation of almost 400 people to renew their vows and celebrate their tenth anniversary.

Among those attending was PFLAG Toronto Board member Ernie Lacasse who married his spouse Ric Reed at MCCT and memories came flooding back to him during this happy event. To quote Ernie, "Almost 400 people were packed into the church and the mood was definitely one of celebration."

Ernie said that during the reciting of the vows he witnessed many couples in the congregation, both young and old, heterosexual and homosexual quietly repeating their own vows right there in the pews, whilst the gay and lesbian couples at the front proudly renewed their marital vows. This was very moving for Ernie and doubtless many of the others present that night.

The service was taped and can be found online if anyone wants to share the warm feelings that were celebrated on that special occasion.

Records show that today there are more than 7,500 married same-sex couples in Canada.




Anne Morrie-Dadson joins the PFLAG Toronto board

During the summer of 2006, when I learned that my sixteen-year-old son was gay, my world changed in an instant. There had been no apparent signs and I struggled with feelings of shock, disbelief, panic and confusion. I felt completely disoriented and experienced a strong sense of loss. Thankfully, I searched the internet for help and found PFLAG. When I called the support line, a friendly, understanding woman named Joan spoke to me at length, allayed my fears and suggested that I attend a sharing meeting. I took Joan's advice and met a group of wonderful, supportive people who helped me to get my life back to a normal equilibrium. I will never forget the words of Irene Miller who said that our children are bravely living their lives "out," so we, as parents, should be out and proud with them. It was an exhilarating experience for my husband and me to march in the Pride Parade for the first time in 2009, and a proud moment when our son pushed his way through the crowd at the side of the road and shouted to his friends, "That's my mom and dad, marching with PFLAG!"

After a thirty year career with Canada Revenue Agency as a Team Leader in the Public Information section, an Auditor and an Appeals Officer, I retired in 2005. I have been a strong advocate for my older son who has a number of exceptionalities. In this regard, I was a member of the Special Education Advisory Committee with the York Catholic District School Board representing Autism Society Ontario.

It is an honour and a privilege to be a member of the Board of Directors of PFLAG Toronto, an organization that has been an enormous help to me and my family. I will do my utmost to assist PFLAG Toronto in continuing to provide its invaluable service to the public.
